

4 / 5 2019-2020 Curriculum Overview (alternates yearly)

Social Studies	The theme of this year is "What is democracy?" and the focus is on the landscape and human history of the United States. During this year, the 4/5s explore topics including: • The geography of the U.S. and how it affects human populations • Indigenous people before the arrival of Europeans • The arrival of European explorers and exploiters • The arrival of enslaved Africans • The cultural encounters between indigenous people, Europeans, and Africans; and their cultural legacies • Life during colonial times • The Declaration of Independence and the US Constitution • The history of voting rights in the U.S. During the year, students also study the locations of all 50 states, and their capitols. Possible field trips: • Train trip to Sacramento for a capitol tour
Reading	This year, in Reading the 4/5's explore: Fiction: Interpreting Characters Non-fiction: Reading the Weather, Reading the World Non-fiction: Reading History, The American Revolution Fiction: Historical Fiction Book Clubs Word Study in the 4/5's includes: Initial assessment (Words Their Way) for spelling pattern knowledge and needs Cursive practice for homework and writing assignments in class Development of content-specific vocabulary Spelling lists generated from Words Their Way word sorts, 100 high frequency word list, and words from each student's writing/editing Practice using dictionaries, glossaries, and thesauruses Mini-lessons and practice with topics such as antonyms, synonyms, homophones, parts of speech, Greek and Latin roots and suffixes, verb tense, and writing conventions.

Writing

This year, the 4/5's continue practicing the writing process by collecting ideas, drafting, revising, editing, and publishing their work. Units of Study include:

- Poetry
- Narrative Writing: The Arc of the Story, Writing Realistic Fiction
- Argument: Persuasive Essays
- Information Writing: Bringing History to Life
- Opinion: The Literary Essay, Writing about Fiction

	Curriculum resources from the Teachers College Reading and Writing Project explore narrative writing, information writing, and opinion/argument writing. Later in the year, fifth graders will speeches, which they present at graduation. The 4/5's do a number of writing projects to practice their skills and build knowledge through social studies and science. They learn and practice keyboarding skills throughout the year.
